



Community Report on Edison Park K-8 Center

A Traditional Parent's Perspective on School Policies and Environment

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Edison Park K 8 Center serves students from PreK through eighth grade in Miami, with approximately 437 students and a class size of approximately seventeen to one. Academically the school generally performs above district norms and is known for its Gifted and Talented offerings and Cambridge International curriculum. According to recent performance metrics around forty-nine percent of students score proficient in math and approximately thirty-nine percent score proficient in reading.

The district requires staff to respect student-chosen names and pronouns starting in early grades, with no opt-out option for parents. From a traditional or faith-based perspective the school earns a **rating of three point five out of ten**. While academic offerings and curriculum quality stand out, district identity protocols may raise concern for some families.

1. Academic Standing and Programs

Edison Park offers a Cambridge International curriculum and Gifted and Talented instruction. Student proficiency rates include about forty-nine percent in math and thirty-nine percent in reading. The school is rated seven out of ten for its academic performance and enrichment opportunities.

2. Student Community and Support Services

The school community includes around four hundred thirty seven students treated in a supportive environment. Support services include ESL, special education, reading intervention programs, counseling, and academic coaches to help struggling learners and enrich advanced students.

3. Facilities and Learning Environment

Campus amenities include standard classrooms, media center, and shared spaces for both elementary and middle grades. The school schedules arrival and dismissal carefully and offers after-school enrichment including clubs and volunteer-led programs. After-school and arts activities support both learning and community engagement.

4. Values and Policy Environment

Miami Dade policy classifies gender identity and sexual orientation as protected categories. Staff are trained in inclusive practices and required to honor student-preferred names and pronouns. While no formal LGBTQ curriculum exists for early grades, inclusive language can appear in announcements, counseling, or classroom discussions.

Parents may wish to request clarity on how identity preferences are handled and how their child's family values will be considered.

5. Recent Incidents or Concerns

In 2015 an off-campus altercation involving a student who brandished a toy gun led to arrest and heightened attention on safety. Though not a formal school incident, it generated parental concern about student supervision and reporting. School leadership has since emphasized safety protocols and parent communication. No new serious incidents have been publicly reported since.

6. Parent Engagement and Communication

Families can stay involved through advisory council meetings, school workshops, and volunteering opportunities. The school uses newsletters and communication apps to share updates. Parents are encouraged to attend events and meet with staff directly to observe learning culture.

7. Parent Concerns and Suggested Actions

Traditional or faith-based families may reflect on:

- How identity and pronoun policies begin in early grades
- Communication and response procedures in case of student misconduct or safety threats
- Academic support available for reading or math proficiency needs
- Ways to participate in advisory council or volunteer programs for involvement and oversight

Steps for parents to consider

- 1 Attend advisory council or PTA meeting early in the school year
 - 2 Meet with teachers to discuss values and expectations for naming or pronoun usage
 - 3 Volunteer in school events or clubs to observe environment firsthand
 - 4 Review the school handbook regarding communication and identity procedures

Final Summary for Parents

Edison Park K 8 Center delivers solid academics, strong Gifted and Talented programs, and structured learning in a PK-8 environment. Yet district identity policies and past off-campus safety concerns may be unsettling for some families. Traditional or faith-based parents may benefit from reviewing school policies, observing classrooms, and engaging in school leadership and community events to ensure their child's education aligns with their family values.
