



Community Report on Gragny Elementary School

A Traditional Parent's Perspective on School Policies and Environment

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Gratigny Elementary serves students from PreK through fifth grade in the Golden Glades area of Miami. Enrollment is approximately 430 students with class sizes typically around sixteen. Academic performance is below district average with roughly fifty percent proficiency in math and forty-eight percent proficiency in reading. Chronic absenteeism is a concern at nearly thirty percent. From a traditional or faith-based viewpoint, the school earns a **rating of 3.5 out of 10**, as academic challenges and required district identity policies may conflict with certain family priorities.

1. Student Demographics & Support Services

The school serves a diverse student body composed of about forty-eight percent Hispanic and forty-six percent African American students. Approximately fifty-five percent of students qualify for free or reduced price lunch. English learners compose about fifteen percent of the student population. The school provides ESL instruction, special education services, reading intervention, counseling, and Title I academic support.

2. Academic Standing & Programs

While academic performance is below average, the school offers Gifted and Talented instruction, STEAM labs, reading and math support groups, summer tutoring, and small group

literacy lessons. These supports aim to close learning gaps and prepare students to meet grade-level expectations.

3. Facilities & Learning Environment

Gratigny Elementary features traditional classrooms, a media center, STEM and arts labs, and outdoor play areas. Arrival and dismissal routines are monitored carefully. The school hosts science fairs, reading nights, and family programs to build community involvement in education.

4. Values & Policy Environment

District policy classifies gender identity and sexual orientation as protected categories. Staff are required to respect students' preferred names and pronouns starting in PreK. There is no formal LGBTQ curriculum at this elementary level; however inclusive language may appear in counseling or announcements. Parents who prefer limited exposure should discuss with school leaders how these policies are practiced and whether family preferences are considered.

5. Bathroom Policy & Privacy

Restrooms at the school remain gender-segregated with separate facilities for boys and girls. There is no evidence of shared bathroom policies. Standard supervision is in place. Parents may visit the campus or ask administration directly if they wish clarification about restroom access policies.

6. Recent Incidents or Concerns

There have been no major safety incidents or misconduct reports. Classroom behavior issues have occurred and some parents report delays in communication from staff. School leadership has introduced protocols to improve behavioral reporting and follow-up on parent concerns.

7. Parent Engagement & Communication

Parents can participate in advisory council meetings, attend Parent Academy workshops, volunteer at reading nights, or engage in school events. A parent newsletter and digital platforms are used for updates. Many families praise staff involvement, though some note that communication response times could improve.

8. Parent Concerns & Suggested Actions

Families with traditional or faith-based values may want to examine:

- How pronoun and identity protocols are introduced to young students
- Availability of academic support for reading and math challenges
- Communication systems for behavior or learning issues
- How families may engage in policy or strategic planning through advisory roles

Recommended steps for parents:

- Visit the school early and meet with leadership to discuss academic and values policies
 - Volunteer in classroom or enrichment events to assess culture and behavior norms
 - Request an updated parent handbook to understand disciplinary expectations and protocols
 - Monitor attendance and academic progress and ask for help when needed
