



## **Community Report on Hialeah Elementary School**

***A Traditional Parent's Perspective on School Policies and Environment***

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Hialeah Elementary serves students from PreK through fifth grade in the city of Hialeah. Enrollment is approximately six hundred eighty students, and class size averages around fourteen children per teacher. Academic achievement is above average in the district with roughly fifty-five percent proficiency in math and fifty-four percent proficiency in reading. From a traditional or faith-based viewpoint the school earns a **rating of 3.5 out of 10**. While academics are strong, required district policies on student identity may be a concern for some families.

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### **1. Student Demographics & Support Services**

The student population is predominantly Hispanic, at around ninety-six percent. A small percentage of students identify as African American or White. Approximately seventy percent qualify for free or reduced-price lunch. The school provides services such as ESL classes, special education, reading and math intervention, academic coaching, and lunch assistance funding.

### **2. Academic Standing & Programs**

Test scores place the school in the top half of the district. Students typically score fifty-five percent or above in math and reading. The school offers preschool, Gifted and Talented programming, small group instruction, STEM activities, reading nights, and instructional

coaching. Academic performance is maintained through classroom supports and parental collaboration.

### **3. Facilities & Learning Environment**

Campus facilities include modern classrooms, a technology lab, media center, quiet reading areas, and safely supervised outdoor spaces. Arrival and dismissal procedures are carefully managed by staff. Community events like reading nights and science fairs are designed to bring families into the learning environment.

### **4. Values & Policy Environment**

Miami-Dade policy treats gender identity and sexual orientation as protected. Staff are required to respect preferred names and pronouns from PreK onward. There is no formal LGBTQ curriculum for early grade students; however inclusive language may appear in counseling or morning announcements. Parents seeking less exposure to these practices may consult school leadership regarding daily implementation and classroom tone.

### **5. Bathroom Policy & Privacy**

Restroom facilities are gender-segregated, with separate areas for boys and girls. Adult supervision is standard in corridors and common areas. No shared or co-ed restrooms are in use. Parents may tour the building or speak with staff to confirm current arrangements.

### **6. Recent Incidents or Concerns**

There are no known recent safety or misconduct issues. A minor gas leak led to a brief evacuation in 2019, handled efficiently. Some parents report delays in communication about small behavioral or academic issues. School leaders have enhanced notification systems and improved follow-up on concerns.

### **7. Parent Engagement & Communication**

Families can participate in advisory council meetings, Parent Academy classes, student literacy events, and volunteer opportunities. The school distributes newsletters and uses parent messaging platforms. Most parents report positive connections with staff, though a few mention occasional slow responses.

### **8. Parent Concerns & Suggested Actions**

Families valuing faith or conservative beliefs may wish to explore:

- how pronoun and identity protocols are introduced to young students
- academic support for students needing extra help
- communication procedures following incidents or attendance concerns
- opportunities to participate in school governance or volunteer teams

**Recommended steps for parents**

- Visit the school early in the year and meet with leadership
  - Speak with your child's teacher to discuss values and expectations
  - Volunteer in reading or enrichment programs to observe culture
  - Review the school handbook to understand discipline, attendance, and identity protocols
