



Community Report on Hialeah Gardens Elementary School
A Traditional Parent's Perspective on School Policies and Environment

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Hialeah Gardens Elementary serves PreK through fifth grade in Hialeah Gardens, Florida. Enrollment is about one thousand eight students with a typical class size of twelve per teacher. Academic achievement is strong, with approximately seventy two percent proficiency in math and sixty nine percent in reading. However chronic absenteeism runs near thirty percent. From a traditional or faith-based viewpoint the school receives a **rating of 3.5 out of 10** due to district identity policies that may conflict with some family values.

1. Student Demographics & Support Services

The student body is approximately ninety five percent Hispanic, two percent White, one percent Asian and under one percent African American. About sixty one percent of students qualify for free or reduced price lunch. The school provides ESL instruction special education reading and math interventions academic coaching and Title I support services.

2. Academic Standing & Programs

Test scores place the school well above district and state averages. Students typically reach seventy two percent proficiency in math and sixty nine percent in reading. The school offers preschool Gifted and Talented classes STEM labs enrichment activities small group instruction summer tutoring and family literacy nights to support academic success.

3. Facilities & Learning Environment

Campus features include modern classrooms technology labs media resources and securely monitored outdoor spaces. Arrival and dismissal routines are carefully structured. Family events such as science fairs reading nights and academic showcases foster community involvement and student recognition.

4. Values & Policy Environment

Under district policy gender identity and sexual orientation are protected categories. Staff are required to respect student preferred pronouns and names from PreK onwards. While no formal LGBTQ curriculum is provided in elementary grades inclusive language may be introduced during counseling or morning announcements. Parents concerned about early exposure may wish to clarify how these policies are implemented and how family values are incorporated in classroom settings.

5. Bathroom Policy & Privacy

Restrooms remain gender-segregated with separate facilities for boys and girls. Adult supervision is standard in hallways and common areas. No shared or coed restrooms are in use. Parents may request a campus tour or ask staff to confirm current restroom policies.

6. Recent Incidents or Concerns

No significant safety problems or misconduct issues have been reported. Chronic absenteeism continues to be a schoolwide concern. Some parents report minor delays in communication regarding classroom events. School leadership has implemented stronger attendance tracking and deeper follow-up procedures.

7. Parent Engagement & Communication

Families may connect via advisory council meetings Parent Academy workshops classroom volunteer events and reading or enrichment nights. Communication is maintained through newsletters, messaging apps and teacher platforms. Most parents note positive staff responsiveness, with few remarks about occasional delays.

8. Parent Concerns & Suggested Actions

Parents aligned with traditional or faith-based values may wish to consider:

- How pronoun and identity policies are introduced to young students
- Support structures for students needing extra academic help
- Communication processes following academic or behavior concerns
- Opportunities to engage in school policy or classroom support

Recommended actions include:

1. Visit the school early and meet leadership to discuss values and programs
 2. Volunteer in reading or enrichment activities to assess classroom tone
 3. Review the school handbook on discipline identity and attendance policies
 4. Join advisory council or parent groups to stay informed and influence school culture

Hialeah Gardens Elementary delivers strong academics, enrichment programming and a caring community environment. Its policies on gender identity and pronoun use may not align with traditional or faith-based preferences. Parents concerned about these issues are encouraged to visit classrooms, meet staff, and observe how policies play out in daily routines to confirm whether the school aligns with family values and educational expectations.
