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A Traditional Parent's Perspective on School Policies and Environment

Howard Drive Elementary serves students from PreK through 5th grade in the Homestead area. It enrolls approximately 430 children with a student-teacher ratio near 16 to 1. Academic proficiency is moderate with about 58 percent in math and 55 percent in reading. Chronic absenteeism is a concern, hovering around 27 percent. From a traditional or faith-based standpoint, the school receives a **rating of 3.5 out of 10**, considering its academic challenges and district identity policies that may not align with certain family values.

1. Student Demographics & Support Services

- Roughly 66 percent Hispanic, 28 percent African American, and a small percentage from other backgrounds
- Approximately 62 percent qualify for free or reduced-price lunch
 Support includes ESL instruction, special education, reading and math tutoring,
 counseling services, academic coaching, and Title I programs focused on learning
 support and attendance recovery

2. Academic Standing & Programs

Math proficiency is typically near 58 percent and reading around 55 percent

- The school offers Gifted and Talented classes, STEAM enrichment, reading nights, small group math instruction, and after-school tutoring
- Structured improvement planning and family academic nights support progress, though consistent attendance remains key

3. Facilities & Learning Environment

- The campus features traditional classrooms, a media center, STEM and art labs, and safe outdoor areas
- Arrival and dismissal routines are monitored by staff
- Community events include science fairs and literacy nights to encourage parent involvement

4. Values & Policy Environment

- District policy classifies gender identity and sexual orientation as protected
- Staff must respect student-chosen names and pronouns from PreK onward
- There is no formal LGBTQ curriculum at this level, but inclusive language may appear during counseling or school announcements
- Parents concerned about early exposure may wish to meet school officials to understand how policies are applied and whether family values are respected in instruction

5. Bathroom Policy & Privacy

- Restrooms remain gender-segregated with separate facilities for boys and girls
- Adult supervision is present in common areas and hallways
- No shared or multi-use restroom policies are in operation
- Parents may ask for a tour or confirmation if desired

6. Recent Incidents or Concerns

- There are no reported major safety or misconduct issues
- Chronic absenteeism remains a challenge affecting learning outcomes
- Some parents report minor delays in communication about classroom incidents
- Leadership has taken steps to strengthen attendance tracking and parent follow-up

7. Parent Engagement & Communication

- Families may engage through advisory council meetings, Parent Academy sessions, reading nights, and volunteer events
- Communication is typically delivered by newsletters, teacher messages, and school alerts
- Most parents report a supportive environment, though a few mention occasional response delays

8. Parent Concerns & Suggested Actions

Families aligned with traditional or faith-based values may wish to consider:

- How identity and pronoun protocols are introduced in early grades
- Availability of academic support for struggling students
- Communication flow following behavior or attendance issues
- Ways to engage through advisory roles or volunteering

Suggested steps for parents:

- Visit the school early in the academic year to meet with administrators
- Volunteer or attend classroom events to observe culture
- Request the parent handbook to review policies on discipline and identity protocols
- Monitor attendance and academic progress and ask for support as soon as with needs

The school operates under district identity policies beginning in early grades and maintains traditional, gender-segregated restroom arrangements. Families seeking an

environment aligned with traditional academic and cultural values may benefit from visiting the school, meeting leadership, and assessing policy application before making decisions.
