



Community Report on Liberty City Elementary School

A Traditional Parent's Perspective on School Policies and Environment

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Liberty City Elementary School serves PreK through Fifth Grade in Miami's Liberty City neighborhood. Enrollment is around 308 students with a student-teacher ratio of about twenty to one. Academic performance is well below district averages; reading and math proficiency fall far short of statewide benchmarks. Chronic absenteeism is a serious concern, affecting between 28 and 45 percent of students in recent years. From a traditional or faith based perspective, the school receives a **rating of 2.5 out of 10**, due to low academic outcomes, high absenteeism, and district identity policies.

1. Student Demographics & Support Services

- Approximately seventy four percent African American, twenty five percent Hispanic, and under one percent other groups

- About seventy four percent qualify for free or reduced price lunch

Support services include English language instruction, special education, gifted support, small group reading and math intervention, counseling, academic coaching, and Title I supported learning and attendance recovery

2. Academic Standing & Programs

- Reading proficiency is very low at approximately thirty four percent, math proficiency also near thirty three percent

- Science proficiency is also quite low at roughly fourteen percent
- The school offers literacy nights and small group instruction and uses instructional coaching, though improvements remain modest

3. Facilities & Learning Environment

Campus includes standard classrooms, a media center, and supervised outdoor areas. Arrival and dismissal are managed by staff. Occasional family events like reading nights support community engagement.

4. Values & Policy Environment

The district classifies gender identity and sexual orientation as protected. Staff must respect student chosen names and pronouns from early grades, with no parental opt-out. No formal LGBTQ curriculum is delivered at this level, though inclusive language may appear during counseling or general announcements. Parents may wish to speak with school leadership to understand how practices align with their values.

5. Bathroom Policy & Privacy

Restrooms remain gender segregated, with separate facilities for boys and girls. Supervision is present in hallways and shared spaces. No shared or co-ed bathroom arrangements are used. Parents may confirm configuration through a tour.

6. Recent Issues of Note

Chronic absenteeism has affected between twenty eight and forty five percent of the student body over recent years. High truancy rates are noted as a barrier to academic learning. There are no public reports of safety incidents or misconduct controversies.

7. Parent Engagement & Communication

Families may attend advisory meetings, reading nights, and volunteer events. Communication is delivered through newsletters and messaging platforms. Parents report caring staff though response times vary.

8. Parent Concerns & Suggested Actions

Families with traditional or faith based values may wish to consider:

- How identity and pronoun policies are introduced to early grade levels
- Structure of academic supports for students performing far below grade level
- Procedures followed when students miss school or have behavior concerns
- Opportunities to participate in school governance or volunteering

Recommended next steps for parents:

- Visit Liberty City Elementary and speak with administrators early in the year
- Attend reading nights or enrichment events to observe school culture
- Request the parent handbook to review discipline, attendance, and identity protocols
- Monitor student attendance and academic progress and request support when needed

Final Summary for Parents

Liberty City Elementary serves a high-need student population and faces serious academic and attendance challenges. Reading, math, and science outcomes are among the lowest in the county. Identity policies begin early and bathrooms remain gender segregated. Families prioritizing academic excellence, consistent attendance, and minimal early exposure to identity discussions may wish to observe the school in action, meet with leadership, and verify how policies are executed to ensure alignment with their family values.
